Senate Committee on Student Discipline 2011-2012 Annual Report

The Senate Committee on Student Discipline (SCSD) met 24 times during the 2012 fiscal year and considered a total of 18 appeals from action of the Subcommittee on Undergraduate Student Conduct (SUSC). Of the 18 appeals, the SCSD affirmed 15, modified three of the hearings, and modified two rules 311.c (relating to trespass notices for campus property). Regarding the three modified hearings, the SCSD determined to make the following changes:

- 1. From immediate dismissal to dismissal held in abeyance until graduation because new information or other relevant facts were clearly not available at the time of the original hearing.
- 2. From dismissal held in abeyance through the end of the term then dismissed to dismissal held in abeyance until graduation because the original hearing was not conducted fairly in light of the charges against the respondent.
- 3. From immediate dismissal to dismissal held in abeyance to allow the student to finish the term and then be dismissed because the sanctions imposed by the hearing body were not appropriate for the violations for which the student was found responsible.

Highlights of 2011-2012

- 1. *Turnover:* The SCSD experienced an unusually high amount of member turnover in 2011-2012, particularly among student members. The committee has addressed this with the Committee on Committees to ensure that appointees have an understanding of the time commitments involved to ensure that all members are trained and prepared for the work before them.
- 2. Discipline Committee Training: For many years, OSCR has conducted a mock hearing for all members of the Subcommittee to familiarize new members with the process. In response to the Dear Colleague Letter from April of 2011 (DCL), we conducted a comprehensive sexual misconduct training in the mock hearing with the help of FYCARE coordinator, Jenn Scott. All members of the discipline process, including the SCSD, were required to attend the training. Due to member attrition, this session was professionally video recorded and all mid-year additions to the disciplinary committees were asked to review this training and material in addition to the standard orientation.
- 3. Subcommittee Selection: OSCR lead the effort to solicit, interview and select new members of the subcommittees. We selected 9 undergraduate students, 1 Graduate student, and 3 faculty members for the coming year.
- 4. Alleged Victim Appeals Procedure: In response to the DCL, the Senate Committee on Student Discipline approved a modification to the Student Disciplinary Procedures which provide for alleged victims of sexual misconduct and sexual harassment to appeal any disciplinary decision. This process has been successfully practiced for all cases in FY12.
- 5. Advocate Database: The issues that we have experienced with the Advocate database have largely been resolved. Drawing statistics from the database has become far simpler and more reliable thanks to the diligent work of our clerical staff.
- 6. Clery Training: An external training and audit of the University's response to the Clery Act revealed several liabilities and room for improvement. OSCR staff worked diligently over Spring Break to prepare the 2011 statistics and feel far more confident in their completeness and accuracy. UIPD has good plans in place for how we will move forward.
- 7. Appeal Process: All members of the SCSD appeal hearings listened to the recordings and reviewed all documents from the original hearing. While this provided for a more fair and comprehensive appeal hearing, this is an extremely time consuming process. OSCR staff continue to explore secure ways for committee members to review recordings of the hearing in an online environment that won't require members to schedule a time to listen to the recording during business hours.
- 8. Discipline Committee Appreciation: The OSCR staff held a subcommittee appreciation for all subcommittee student and faculty members in the ODOS newly acquired Illini media space.

Student Disciplinary Statistics Executive Summary

- The Office for Student Conflict Resolution heard a total of 2283 cases in original jurisdiction in FY 12. This represents a significant increase over last year's total (+12.13%).
 - 1873 formal hearing officer disciplinary cases (+23.39%)
 - o 75 Subcommittee on Undergraduate Student Conduct cases (+19.05%)
 - o 325 first time academic integrity notices (-28.57%)
- The Senate Committee on Student Discipline heard 18 appeals in in FY12. Of that number, 15 decisions were upheld without changes and 3 were modified. In FY11, the SCSD heard 13 appeals.
- The Subcommittee on Undergraduate Student Conduct heard 16 petitions in FY12, Of that number, 13 petitions were approved and 3 were denied. In FY11, the SUSC heard 22 petitions.
- The Subcommittee on Undergraduate Student Conduct heard 10 appeals in FY12. Of that number, 9 decisions were upheld without changes and 1 was modified. In FY11, the SUSC heard 8 appeals.
- The Executive Director heard 40 petitions for removal of transcript notations. Of that number, 38 petitions were granted (95%). In FY11, he heard 35 petitions.
- OSCR referred 139 students to AODO in accordance with the Mandatory Assessment policy. These students were not subject to disciplinary action. We referred 104 students in FY11 (+33.65%)

- In FY11, OSCR staff handled 521 disciplinary background checks (+9.45%) and 246 federal background checks (-15.17%).


